
The Adventures of Bella & Harry:

Facts About Easter Island

Directions: Think back about the story and answer the following questions.

1. What body of water surrounds Easter Island? Easter Island is a territory of which country?

Easter Island is surrounded by the Pacific Ocean. Easter Island is a territory of the country of Chile.

2. Ahu Tongariki is made up of how many moai statues?

Ahu Tongariki is made up of 15 moai statues.

3. What is the native language of Easter Island? What is the official language?

The native language is Rapa Nui and the official language is Spanish.

4. Why do some moai sites use the word "ahu" in their name?

It means that the moai sit on a cement block and (or) is a special place where many moai stand.

5. Do the moai at Ahu Akivi face the ocean or do they have their backs to the ocean?

They face the ocean.

6. What is another name for the topknot of a moai? What kind of rock is it made of?

It can also be called a "pukao" and it is made out of volcanic rock.

7. What are some things you remember about Rano Raraku?

It is a quarry where the moai statues were carved and is actually a volcano crater. In fact, there are 3 main volcanoes on Easter Island and they are all sleeping (dormant) right now.

8. What is the name of the ancient Easter Island competition for the strongest warriors?

The Birdman competition.

9. What food might someone eat during a visit to Easter Island? How is it made?

A typical meal is Umu Rapa Nui, also known as Easter Island Curanto. It is cooked in a hole in the ground, with fire wood and hot stones which are covered in plantain leaves. Meat, chicken or fish is placed on the leaves. A second layer of leaves is added and then vegetables will go on top. This is then covered with more plantain leaves and then a final layer of dirt.

10. What was something that you learned about the moai statues on Easter Island?

There are many correct answers to this question. Some are as follows: some are buried with their full bodies underneath the dirt / they can be carved from basalt or volcanic rock / they average 13 feet in height and 14 tons in weight / not all moai have topknots


